Subsequently he founded the Bob Champion Cancer research Unit in 1986 with the Royal Marsden Hospital.

Our first venture in conjunction with Newton Abbot Races was a great success and very enjoyable notwithstanding the appalling weather. We are very grateful to Pat Masterson and all his team at Newton Abbot Races for allowing us the opportunity to hold a collection on a Race Day and perhaps being able to return again next year. Fibroscan Hepatic Fibrosis Measurement System.

A new machine for measuring damage to the liver has been bought for Torbay Hospital by the Torbay Hospital League of Friends. Death from liver disease is increasing substantially and the new Fibroscan machine dramatically increases the Hospital's ability to diagnose liver problems much quicker than before.

Dr. Keith George said "The Fibroscan machine kindly purchased by the League of Friends has changed the way patients with liver disease are assessed at Torbay Hospital. The Fibroscan machine can accurately assess the degree of damage suffered by the liver due to a variety of conditions thus helping make more informed treatment decisions. It is a quick and painless test. Previously the degree of liver damage was assessed by a biopsy of liver (potentially uncomfortable and time consuming) or a Fibroscan performed in Derriford Hospital, Plymouth (time consuming). Patients with liver disease at Torbay Hospital can now have a Fibroscan performed as part of their initial consultation in the outpatient de-

partment helping make quicker treatment decisions for our patients."

David Rogers Chairman of the League said the League was delighted to have been able to find the money for this machine and was delighted "that the League could provide a machine which would have such an enormous benefit to patients with liver problems in the Torbay area"

PILGRIMS PROGRESS

Colin's first Camino was the Camino de Santiago, a 1,000-year-old pilgrimage to the shrine of St James which is displayed in the Cathedral, Santiago de Compostela. Over 100,000 travellers make the pilgrimage to the city every year.

The first Camino, a distance of 546-miles, took Colin 27 days to complete, travelling through, Pamplona, Burgos, Leon, Astorga and Molinaseca.

Colin said: "When you come to Molinaseca you have reached the highest point on the Santiago Camino.

"A very spiritual place where pilgrims or pilgrinos as we are called, stop and place

messages to loved ones and lost loves plus many other personal feelings. They place a stone, a picture, beads and many religious artifacts.

"It's a very moving human experience. You place what you want to leave behind on one side and walk to the other side, feeling a sense of a new beginning."

As Colin approached Santiago he noticed that the route had become busier, and more and more people joined the pilgrimage to the cathedral.

Colin said: "On reaching Santiago you see the people you met along the way, there is a lot of hugging and back-slapping to celebrate your achievement.

"The Piligino Mass for travellers at the cathedral is very moving, especially when they swing the incense urn from the ceiling of the Cathedral."

After completing the Camino, Colin decided to take on a second journey, travelling another pilgrim route, the Camino de Fisterra, from Santiago to Finisterre.

This Camino route pre-dates Christianity, and Pagans would make the pilgrimage





to Fisterra on the Costa da Morte, known as the coast of death to make offerings and prayers to the gods, as it is where they believed the end of the world was. As the sun set, it was a common idea at the time, that Finisterre was where the sun died, and that there may even be a link there between the worlds of the dead and the living.

Colin said: "When you reach Cabo Fisterra it is the end of the Comino, and there is a plaque there that says zero km. Ninety five percent of pilgrims finish in Santiago. But I carried on to Finistere, then to Muxia and back to Santiago again. The scenery and the sunsets take your breath away, you can see why they thought it was the end of the world."

The third Camino Colin embarked on was the Camino Del Norte, this 546-mile journey takes walkers from Santiago to Irun.

Colin added: "Irun is hard and tiring, but with stunning views.

"I walked the reverse way to everybody else. People normally end up in Santiago;

I did the round trek starting in St Jean Pied du Paul to Santiago, Finisterre, and Muxia, back to Santiago then Comino del Norte back to St Jean du Luz."

Colin added: "Your faith in human kindness is restored and it warms your heart

"I would also like to thank the whole team at the Wuji Taiji Academy, through my Tai Chi and martial arts I was able to achieve what I set out to do. Without the training I doubt if I could have lasted."

Colin completed one final walk from Dorset to his home in Torbay. Colin said: "The walk will follow the Jurassic path from Poole, Weymouth, Bridport, Lyme Regis, Seaton, Exmouth, Dawlish, Teignmouth, Torquay and into Paignton.

Torbay Hospital Eye Department has opened a dedicated eye surgical simulation lab after a generous donation from the Torbay Hospital League of Friends.

According to Consultant Ophthalmologist Tamsin Sleep, 'Simulation is the way forward in surgical training and this cash from the League has enabled us to have

this facility which is a tremendous help with our training programme.



'The ability to easily access realistic high and low tech simulation models are transforming surgical training, by prioritising patient safety, and improving the quality of training opportunities'.

The General Medical Council and the Royal Medical Colleges have recommended that simulation is used to support training, and will soon recommend that its use is mandatory.

South Devon Healthcare Trust has always been ahead of the game in providing simulation facilities to trainees in the region, and the eye department is no exception, demonstrating its commitment to patient safety and the quality of the training it provides.

This donation by the League of Friends to the ophthalmology department at Torbay Hospital has allowed the department to remove any barriers to the uptake of simulation in training by providing a bespoke Simulation Lab right in the heart of the Eye Surgery Unit.

Patricia Roberts, President of the Torbay Hospital League of Friends said " Some time ago we were left a sum of money to be used specifically as may be required by the Eye Department and I am delighted that we were able to use these funds for something as important as training for future doctors"


After having spent 5 months in Torbay

After her children grew up Reenie turned her energies to local organisations and helping others.


She was a founder member of Babbacombe and St Marychurch Inner Wheel of which she was President several times as well as becoming District Chairman.
